Incident Summary:

The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) continues to monitor the evolving Coronavirus Disease, also known as COVID-19, situation closely. CISA is taking part in interagency and industry coordination calls and working with critical infrastructure partners to prepare for possible disruptions to critical infrastructure that may stem from widespread illness.

FEMA reports approximately 7,145,539 (+105,621) cases and 408,025 (+3,629) deaths worldwide. In the U.S. there are approximately 1,994,283 (+20,486) cases and 112,967 (+834) deaths

- FEMA deployed 2,658 (+11) employees in support of COVID-19 response
- 22,050,891 (+357,258) COVID-19 tests administered nationwide as of 11 JUN

Washington schools expected to reopen this fall with in-person learning after long coronavirus closures.

Washington's school chief said Thursday that he expects school districts to reopen buildings and return to in-person learning next school year, as long as public health guidelines allow them to do so.

HEALTHCARE AND PUBLIC HEALTH

The CDC is closely monitoring large gatherings and protests for any spikes in COVID cases.

An Emergency Use Authorization (EUA) was issued for the Illumina COVIDSeq Test, the first COVID-19 diagnostic test using next-generation sequencing technology to generate information about the genomic sequence of the virus, which enables tracing of transmission routes and viral mutation events.

FDA has updated their list of approved Non-NIOSH approved N95 mask substitutes to show which ones can no longer be decontaminated for reuse.

A single-day record of more than 2,500 people tested positive for COVID-19 in Texas.

Arizona coronavirus cases nearly double since Memorial Day as state nears hospital capacity. The number of cases has climbed by nearly 300% since May 1 and have roughly doubled since Memorial Day.

The U.S. Army laboratory at the Walter Reed Army Institute of Research has selected a lead COVID-19 vaccine candidate as well as two backup vaccine candidates "that will advance to the next stage of research."

ACTIVATIONS AND DECLARATIONS

57 Major Disaster Declarations approved; all State / Territory EOCs activated.

Eight states / territories have stay at home orders in place; 34 states/territories have lifted their stay at home orders, though may have other movement restrictions; four states lifted state-wide orders, but maintain regional stay at home orders; three have not issued state-wide stay at home orders and have lifted all regional orders; and seven states never enacted stay at home orders.

Indiana will move to Phase 4 of its five-step reopening plan, allowing bars to open at 50 percent capacity along with movie theaters, amusement parks, and office buildings.

Missouri announced the state will fully reopen and enter Phase 2 of its "Show Me Strong Recovery" plan on June 16. As Missouri enters Phase 2, there will be no statewide health order and all statewide restrictions will be lifted, although local officials will still have the authority to put in place further rules and regulations.

Puerto Rico announced it will lift nearly all restrictions, which means beaches, churches, and businesses across the U.S. territory will reopen after three months.
